
Media Technology Upgrade

The work is done. Our equipment has been upgraded. And, hopefully, we are all pleased with the results of this upgrade for the visual presentations in our worship services. As stated at the beginning, the cost of this upgrade was significant. The work began on a Wednesday with the anticipation it would be completed on Friday. The project was complex, and there were times some of us wondered if it would be completed in time to use the new equipment on the coming Sunday. It was so touch and go at times, we devised a Plan A and a Plan B for our Sunday morning worship. What a relief when everything was installed and working by 5 p.m. Friday. Two workers returned the following Monday to remove the projector that was hanging from the ceiling in the middle of the sanctuary. Had you noticed it was gone? We have kept that projector for possible future use.

The next few pages contain pictures to give you an idea of what it took to remove the 20-year old screen (estimated at 200-250 pounds) and install the two 98-inch TVs. Praise the Lord all work was completed safely. Just getting the lift into and out of the choir loft was a huge challenge.

The Before and After pictures ...



How many men are required to take down a large screen? Answer is 4 with a lift and some rope ... 3 men appear in these pictures and #4 is in the attic above them.
















TVs are up ... now to get the lift out of the choir loft ...





While we were at it, we upgraded the sound and media furniture in the balcony.








News from Felipe and Valerie Colby

During that time, mission-related items will be handled by our daughter, *Colonel* Cecilia Colby. An honorific title to be sure, but she will be managing the *cache* of emails and coordination between the staff in Honduras and the board of directors while we are away.

Prayer is *pronunciation* to God, right? Let's go!

- ~That our sabbatical will be like *espresso* to our souls and that we will be refreshed for God's work in Honduras.
- ~For the two mission teams going to Honduras in March, that the team members would be in the pink, like *salmon!*

World Mission Builders

Dear friends and partners,

We are incredibly grateful for the support you have blessed us with over the past five months. Your generosity has brought hope and change to many lives and ministries of our churches in the Philippines. Thanks to your help, we have achieved incredible milestones:

Feeding Program

- Completed a trial feeding program in twenty-two of our churches, providing \$3600. We fed and shared the gospel with over nineteen hundred children. We would like to selectively continue this program in five churches and need a donor to contribute \$250 per month to make this happen. These five churches have achieved amazing results (See video clip).

Roof Line Repair

- Completed a roof line repair for \$600 for Pastor Alquin at Jaclupon Church of Christ on Cebu.

Cebu Church Camp

- Finished an unfinished project at Cebu Church Camp for \$1500. (See pictures).

Light Church Camp Repairs

- Completed long overdue repairs to Light Church Camp on Negros for \$1800. (See pictures). Added a new water pump to provide clean water for over 250 campers coming to a sports camp in June.

Mountain View Church of Christ

- Repaired the church ceiling and parsonage interior and roof severely damaged by a typhoon. Cost \$3400 (See pictures). Near Completion.

Mondragon Samar Philippines Build

- Stepped out in faith to do a major build at Mondragon Samar Philippines. (See pictures). We are building a 36 foot by 54-foot typhoon-proof church building and drilling a deep well with potable clean water to provide water on our property. They are a congregation of seventy-five who have waited ten years for this building. Their present church and grounds are featured above.

Our mission trip is from July 13-26th. The missionaries from World Mission Builders and Hope In Harvest pay their own way. All funds go directly to the project. We are all volunteers with no administrative costs, ensuring one hundred percent of donations are used for ministry.
